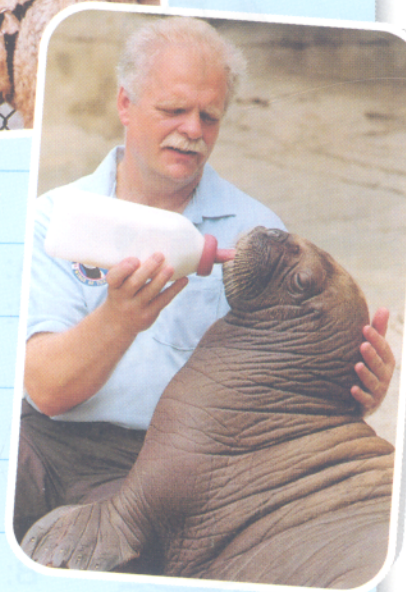


Karlie's Report
